Add autumn shades: Fiery coloured foliage plants, aloes and late flowering perennials (red hot pokers, asters, Cape and marguerite daisies). Sow winter flowering annuals: Namaqualand daisies, calendula, Iceland and Shirley poppies towards the end of the month. For fragrance, plant sweet peas, alyssum and nemesia. <u>Plant cool season vegetables:</u> Broad beans, beetroot, cabbage, carrots, celery, endive, kale, leeks, lettuce, onion, parsley, peas, radish, spinach and turnips. <u>Fruits in season:</u> Apples, bananas, pears, plums, pomegranates, quinces, mangoes, pineapples and grapes.

DIY garden tools:

Tin with holes for a watering can; Plastic meat trays & egg boxes for planting seeds in; CDs & tops of tins to write plant names on; Spade/scoop made from milk carton; 2-litre plastic cool drink bottle with hole for slow watering

Useful waste:

Egg shells crumbled to deter snails; Wood ash (not coal ash) is excellent for compost; Used tea bags for trench beds or compost

Tortoises of the Western Cape



The tortoise (DG Jimmy's favourite pet) is a land-dwelling reptile and the world is home to about 43 species with adults ranging in size from 10cm to 1metre. South Africa has 13 species and 8 are found in the W. Cape alone. This makes the W. Cape an international tortoise hotspot, because on less than 1% of the earth's surface, we find almost a quarter of all know species and there is even an endemic species found nowhere else on earth—the geometric tortoise.
